

Objectives:

- OUR 8-STEP APPROACH
- To familiarize ourselves with the urban garden setting while engaging in all-farm based activities
- To create a year-round crop plan that presents a more comprehensive illustration of seasonal

Significance:

Our ongoing engagement with the urban gardens allowed us to formulate a crop plan capable of laying down a foundation for improving the productivity of future garden endeavours, which has the potential to increase food security in the West End community

Resolving gaps in objectives through regular recap sessions

FINDINGS High pest pressure

2 High weed pressure

Lack of direct sunlight resulted in dark and humid growing conditions suitable for invasive species

EXPLANATIONS

Growth of unsuitable crop types



Improved Crop Plan

Lack of a comprehensive, all-year round crop plan for growing cycles
