

Gordon Neighbourhood House (GNH)




Community food hub based in the West End


"...uses food to nourish our community [through] intercultural exchange, community capacitybuilding, and community development [1]"

Why Urban Farming?

Increase access to fresh fruits and vegetables in cities







Our Question

What are the impacts of the GNH urban farming program in the West End?



Observed participants Interviewed and surveyed (n=9) volunteers and in the GNH urban stakeholders farming program

Consolidated and compiled yield data

Our Findings

100%

of respondents were confident in growing their own food in the future

277 lbs of produce harvested in 2017 that went to community lunches and mobile produce market

Interview Responses

"...promotes physical activity and socialization with other members."

"I started to include more fresh herbs in my meals."

Take Home Message

Other organizations should consider adopting the strategies used by **GNH**

GNH Urban Farming brings benefits to the community

Local government should support Urban Farming programs
