Who are they: Community garden established by Hastings Community Association (found in 1935) Mission: Enhance involvement, capacity and connection of Hastings-Sunrise community

through food & garden programming What they do: Provide cooking and nutrition workshops, luncheons for seniors and hands-on opportunities to grow & harvest food and plants<sup>[5]</sup>

Why: Provide space and opportunity for community interactions that strengthen food & garden

- Increase intercultural & intergenerational **DIVERSITY** in community involvement
- Raise AWARENESS of community garden among community members of Hastings-Sunrise Area [1]
- Improve COMMUNITY FOOD SECURITY

"Community Food Security is when all members of a community have ability to safe, culturally acceptable, nutritionally adequate food through a sustainable food system that optimizes community self reliance and social justice"[6]

Provides an educational space that encourages diversity, cultural integration, social interaction, & community resilience. [4,7]

**Host Community** Gathering


Converse in person with community members about how to better facilitate garden inclusivity

## **GARDEN** MAP


How to plan a garden for the best use of space
